

Contemplative Prayer

We meet once a week, on Monday evenings from 5:30-6:30 pm. We practice a form of prayer called Contemplative or Centering Prayer. It is a silent, meditative form of prayer.

The first half of our meeting is given over to group discussion of a reading selected by the group that is typically from well-known authors who practice and write about this form of worship.

The second half of our meeting is when we practice contemplative prayer as a group. Some have called this form of silent prayer "resting in God."

Education for Ministry

EfM is a four year program administered by the University of the South. It consists of Old Testament (Year 1), New Testament (Year 2), Church History (Year 3) and Theology (Year 4). Participants report on weekly reading assignments given in the EfM



Reading and Reflection Guide and, in addition, develop skills in Theological Reflection (TR). By examining their own beliefs and their relationship to our culture and the tradition of our Christian faith, participants learn what it means to be effective ministers, not clergy, in the world.


1:30) pm. Youth group will not meet in the evening on the 4th Sunday.

Godly Play Year 2

We took a leap of faith in the Kidz Zone last year and embraced the Godly Play curriculum after a 5year hiatus. It was a learning experience as we transitioned from high energy to a more calm hands-on experience. It had a few bumps, but we will once again dive deeper into the mystery of our faith. If you are unfamiliar with the curriculum, here is a description from the Godly Play website:

The Godly Play® method is a curriculum of spiritual practice exploring the mystery of God's presence in our lives. The Godly Play curriculum engages what is most exciting about religious education: God inviting us into—and pursuing us in the midst of—Scripture and spiritual experience.

Godly Play practice teaches us to listen for God and to make authentic and creative responses to God's call in our lives.

Godly Play is a creative, imaginative approach to Christian formation and spiritual guidance. Godly Play has a foundation of 40+ years of research and practice.

Godly Play values process, openness, discovery, community and relationships.

Godly Play models the worship life, stories, symbols and rituals of Christian congregations. Godly Play allows practitioners to make relevant and personal theological meaning.

Godly Play nurtures participants to larger dimensions of belief and faith through wondering and play.

Sunday school and Children's Chapel will begin on October 1st. Sunday School and Children's Chapel takes place the 1st Sunday of every month (except September) starting at 9:30am. Children's Chapel begins at 10:45am and we take the kids to their families during the Peace. Kids aged 3 (potty trained) - 5th grade are welcome and must be registered. NOTES FROM THE MUSIC STAND Dakota Bennett, Music Director

I hope you all have had a wonderful summer. It is certainly my favorite season. From the warm weather to traveling and conventions, I find myself looking forward to the summer all year. Even growing up, where my homeschool experience didn't include getting the summer off, there was still time for travel and adventures. In the last several years, while functioning on a school year schedule, summer has also been a period of transition. Graduations, incoming classes, faculty changes and bittersweet goodbyes were accompanied by new introductions. These times of transition also provided a space to reflect on what has happened and what is to come.

I think back a year ago to my graduation from WSU, the move to Philadelphia and all that has changed in just one year.

When I arrived in Philadelphia, we were still wearing masks! -- Especially when working with children. Now, we are headed into the first truly post-pandemic school year.

Dakota served as a Ministry Resident at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in center city Philadelphia. His liturgical duties included setting up for daily as well as seasonal and special masses, in what he describes as a transitional Anglo-Catholic church. Additional responsibilities included supervising the children's choir, teaching Sunday School to 8- to 10year-olds and managing the food cupboard, which was open four days a week.



School isn't the only thing on a September - May schedule. Much of our programming and

events here at St. James also fall within this cycle. As this new season begins, I invite you to reflect back on your own lives as well as think about what you'd like the future to hold. When my journey first brought me to this community, one of the things which had a significant impact was the statement repeated at the beginning of every service: "Whoever you are and wherever you are on your journey of faith, you are welcome here." As this next season of time in our journey begins to unfold, I want to extend those same words to our entire community and especially all of you within the music program. Maybe you haven't been involved since Covid or even longer. Maybe you have never been in one of our choirs. Maybe you are involved in one facet and want to explore another. Whatever your circumstances, I hope that you will join us as we begin this new chapter of our collective journey together. I also want you to know that the music office/choir room door is always open (so to speak), so feel free to stop in if you catch me in the office or contact me to set up a time to meet. I look forward to seeing you all in church, the choir room or wherever else we meet!

When Dakota is not in his office, he just may be at Old Cowtown Living History Museum, where he has volunteered for many years. He performs with the "Entre' Nous Club Victorian Dancers" once or twice a month, April through



October. He has numerous jobs at the museum: he is responsible for Artifacts Philanthropy, is a candidate for the Board of Directors and just might be found cleaning a building.

Altar Guild Volunteer Opportunities

Over the past 18 months my articles have focused on providing explanations about the things you see on or around the altar; including flowers, candles, and the colors of the various seasons of the church year. Prior to COVID, we could work in teams of two whose primary duty was to set-up for the 8:30 and 10:45 Sunday services. We are no longer able to work in teams because our number of volunteers has decreased significantly. The Altar Guild members perform other duties including support to our parishioners for baptisms, weddings, funerals, and preparation of kits for the Lay Eucharist Ministers. Training is provided one on one or in small groups. Once your training is completed, you will be assigned to work with an experienced member. A binder with written instructions, pictures and checklists are provided and available in the church Sacristy. We also have a small library of reference materials available that provide history and background information on the actions of Altar Guilds within the Episcopal Church. Listed below is a brief description of the functions performed by the Altar Guild and opportunities to serve. Members of the Altar Guild will be available to answer your questions during the Ministry Fair scheduled for September.

Listed below is a brief description of volunteer opportunities:

- 1. Saturday service 5:30 set up and clean-up 20 minutes before the service and 25 minutes after the service
- 2. Sunday service 8:30 service set up before and clean up after in preparation for the 10:45 service
- 3. Sunday service 10:45 clean up after the service and which includes washing, drying and storing the Eucharist vessels
- 4. Prepare Lay Eucharistic Visitor Kits: approximately twice a month or as needed. Preparation of the kits takes about 15 minutes. Cleaning the chalice and patten, refilling the wine carafe and filling the wafer container with blessed items
- 5. Wash and iron Eucharist Linens: twice a month, depending on the number of regular and special services conducted.
- 6. Assist with set up for weddings with or without Eucharist: as needed when notified by the Priest
- 7. Assist with set up for funerals with or without Eucharist: as needed when notified by the Priest
- 8. Arrange or order altar flowers: weekly or high feast days
- 9. Assist with the preparation for special occasions to include set up for Thanksgiving, Advent, Christmas Eve services and Christmas Day, Set up for and assistance with Ash Wednesday services, Palm Crosses preparation, assistance with Maundy Thursday services including the Foot Washing and stripping of the Altar, preparation for the Easter Vigil and Easter services.

As soon as Mother Dawn or Krystal in the office notifies us that someone could use a quick meal, a DOK member will deliver a container of soup, along with fresh bread or rolls, to any parishioner who has been ill, suffered an injury, returned home after surgery, welcomed a new baby or who may be dealing with a crisis.

The **Meal Train** program has also been reinstated to assist people who need help with meals for a week or two. This service was coordinated for many years by Kelly Harper and Jeri Moss. Kelly will again assist with scheduling: when Meal Train is requested, she will contact the recipient to identify dietary needs,



allergies, preferences and the best time for deliveries to be made. She then activates the program and all participants will receive a private e-mail sign-up schedule. - The St. James Refugee Family Project will hold its second volunteer training in August. Interested persons should enroll at the International Rescue Committee website. Co-chairs: Suzanne Laycock and Jessica Moore
- The **Outreach Committee** is conducting several fund-raising events to support our new Refugee Project. We gave them a \$500. Pocket Change donation and held a **Quilt Raffle** in the summer and a **Bingo Dinner** night in August. A **Valentine event** is planned for February.
- Because of a critical shortage of blood in our community hospitals, the American Red Cross has asked us to host four Blood Drives each year. Thanks to the work of Chair Dottie Evans Clark and her assistant, Sarah Robinson, we are able to meet this request.
- St. James has joined the Wichita Minster's effort to provide Saturday Sack Lunches for the homeless at St. John's Episcopal Church. To help, please contact Project Chair Joan Bledsoe with assistance from Jessica and Chase Moore.
- As part of our **100 Year Celebration**, our committee has refurnished five **Family Visitation Rooms** at **St. Francis Ministries** offices on East Harry. These rooms provide supervised meeting places for foster children and their families. Every four to six weeks, our committee refreshes and restocks these rooms. **Chair Judy Goodpasture**
- During the summer we have once again collected water bottles for the clients at **Breakthrough ESS**. **Project Chair: Mary Druding**
- We collected school supplies for The Pando Initiative. Project Chair: Hew Goodpasture
- Our committee continues to send **Prayer Cards** to ill and bereaved parishioners. Birthday cards are also sent to parishioners. **Co-chairs: Mary Druding, Joan Bledsoe,** and **Judy Goodpasture**
- Also, **Deacon Jeff Roper's Card Ministry** for inmates at the **Winfield Correction facility** continues. Just drop off new cards in the hall basket. Inmates are allowed just two cards per month. Since there are 550 inmates, our cards go fast.
- In late September, we will begin our **Blanket Drive** for the homeless served by Humankind in their shelters. **Chair: Judy Goodpasture**
- This fall we will be offering volunteer opportunities through United Way's Read-to-Succeed program and the Pando Initiative's Reality U, a finance workshop for high school students.

Breakthrough/Pantry & Hygiene Needs

Hello! I'm reaching out today to let you know that Breakthrough has identified some items that are in demand and needed as we seek to serve those who have become accustomed to living on the streets. These items are utilized through the following programs:

ShowerUp Mobile Unit – the unit is on Breakthrough's campus on Wednesday mornings, and our team of volunteers assists folks with the opportunity to take showers. The items we find are needed include:

- Individual-sized shaving cream cans
- Disposable razors for shaving
- Individual-sized anti-perspirant
- Men's cotton spandex boxer briefs (not white)
- New or Used (but clean) t-shirts in L and M sizes

Breakfast Bags on the Go – these items are often added to breakfast bags that have a protein item and a carb item. Donations of these items extends our funds for feeding the homeless.

- Bulk quantities of individual servings of fruit
- Bulk quantities of pop tarts
- Bulk quantities of peanut butter crackers

Clubhouse meals – Donations of these items extends our ability to support our Clubhouse members with a nutritious meal and an opportunity to work in the kitchen preparing a meal.

- Fresh eggs (we go through 100 each week)
- Fresh produce when available
- Dried goods in bulk

A Fence or an Ambulance?

'Twas a dangerous cliff, as they freely confessed, though to walk near its crest was so pleasant; but over its terrible edge there had slipped a duke and full many a peasant. So the people said something would have to be done, but their projects did not at all tally; some said, 'Put a fence 'round the edge of the cliff, '

some, 'An ambulance down in the valley.'

But the cry for the ambulance carried the day, for it spread through the neighboring city; a fence may be useful or not, it is true, but each heart became full of pity for those who slipped over the dangerous cliff; And the dwellers in highway and alley gave pounds and gave pence, not to put up a fence, but an ambulance down in the valley.

'For the cliff is all right, if you're careful,' they said, 'aznd if folks even slip and are dropping, it isn't the slipping that hurts them so much as the shock down below when they're stopping.' So day after day, as these mishaps occurred, quick forth would those rescuers sally to pick up the victims who fell off the cliff, with their ambulance down in the valley.

Then an old sage remarked: 'It's a marvel to me that people give far more attention to repairing results than to stopping the cause, when they'd much better aim at prevention. Let us stop at its source all this mischief, ' cried he, 'come, neighbors and friends, let us rally; if the cliff we will fence, we might almost dispense with the ambulance down in the valley.' This poem, "An Ambulance Down in the Valley" was written by British temperance activist Joseph Malins in 1895. A century later, South African Anglican Bishop Desmond Tutu said, "There comes a point where we need to stop just pulling people out of the river. We need to go upstream and find out why they're falling in."

In the coming months, St. James will join forces with dozens of local congregations in launching a new justice ministry tackling the challenges that Tutu and Malins described. This new ministry is being organized through the Direct Action and Research Training Center (DART), with the support of the Kansas Episcopal Diocese. DART has supported the creation of justice ministries in cities across the nation, including Topeka, Lawrence, and Kansas City, where Episcopal congregations have been key partners.

The St. James Justice Ministry Team is currently forming and will help to lead community-wide listening sessions and action to address justice issues facing our community. There many ways to become involved in this effort; your input is needed and valued. Junior Warden's Report

The most recent building improvement to control and reduce energy consumption and cost has been completed. The last two older boilers which provide our heat have been replaced with a high efficiency condensing boiler which matches the lead boiler. These two boilers operate in a cascade fashion and with this change out our Natural Gas consumption will reduce and help to control cost and reliability. Overall our energy consumption is down after several years of improvements and refinements to the HVAC system. I would sing the praises of our professional service partners and the Vestry for the support and knowledgeable effort that they have provided. To hold our own and to indeed reduce cost in the face of rising utility rates is forward movement in the conservation area.

Along those lines we have applied for a grant through Interfaith Power and Light which will be funded through a Department of Energy grant program. This is being provided for Not for Profit institutions to implement energy conservation measures which may not be within the financial reach of those entities. Houses of worship fall within those parameters. It will be several months down the road before we hear of any progress. Thank you to Claudette Johns for her hard work on behalf of the Creation Care Committee for this application work.

Calling all gardeners! All of our lives and responsibilities change as time takes us forward. Our Gardens are needing help. Master gardening skills are not required. This amounts to mostly weeding and occasionally spreading mulch. Some trimming is needed but guidance and direction is always available. Let me know by text or e-mail and I will get your name on the list of helpers. This usually happens on a Saturday morning before the temperature gets too high.

About a year ago St James came to the rescue of a Scout Troop and Pack. Their Chartering Organization was not able to continue their sponsorship and we became the Chartering Organization. The Pack and Troop will be moving physically to St James this fall so expect to see some Scouts around and being involved in some of our activities. Both Units have plans to be with St James at Open Streets ICT this year. An Eagle Scout Court of Honor is in the planning with another to come in the relatively near future.

St. James is blessed with spacious а especially property, considering the location of the church. With the blessing of land, comes the necessity to care for it. Many members work hard, even in the heat of summer, to keep the exterior spaces of the church maintained. From the Treasurer

Woody Swain, Treasurer

As you make contributions towards St. James' operating budget, there are many options available to you for doing this. Most of these options are geared towards helping you to better manage your money and a few are geared towards tax advantages.

Many of our members, like me, continue to contribute by regularly placing cash or checks in the offering plate during the service. But, an increasingly popular way to fulfill pledges is to arrange for recurring credit card or bank draft payments. This can be arranged directly with our bookkeeper, Susie Stallings, by filling out a simple one page form, or you can log into your online "Realm" account with St. James and set up recurring contributions by credit card or bank draft. Susie or the church office (Krystal Poindexter) would be glad to help you. If you don't have an active Realm account but you want to give online, there are a few options. You can click the "Give" link at the top-right of the church homepage, scan the QR code on the back of the bulletin, or use the texting option that is printed near the offertory each week.

For larger, one-time contributions, a few members will contribute stocks shares directly to St. James. If you let Susie know ahead of time that you are arranging to contribute equities into St. James' Schwab brokerage account, she can monitor our account so that this contribution is converted to cash in a timely manner and then transferred to our bank account.

Since I am of an age that requires me to take annual minimum distributions (RMD's) from my IRA, I use the Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) strategy to save on income taxes as I fulfill my pledge. My IRA is with Schwab, and they have issued me a book of blank checks that I can use to make withdrawals of any size from my IRA. QCD amounts from an IRA are not subject to federal or state income tax, and since I take the Standard Deduction rather than itemizing, QCD's reduce the amount of my RMD that is subject to income tax, which is a nice savings to me. This strategy is well known among financial advisors, brokerages and banks, and I would be pleased to discuss my use of QCD's with you in more detail.





The culinary gardens grow foods in spaces that are inclusive of all ages and levels of mobility. They are a wonderful space for learning about the many facets of gardening.

The Prairie garden focuses on native grasses and vegetation. They are creating space for pollinators (including Monarchs) and reminding us of the importance of having prairie vegetation in a prairie ecosystem. They are focuses on biodiversity and growing plants that can grow in the harsh Kansas weather without incredible amounts of water and fertilizer.

The Meditative gardens are quiet spaces developed for quiet reflection in nature. From quietly flowing water to the songs of birds and insects, they are a calm and peaceful setting to come and listen for the voice of something greater. They are a refreshing place to sit and 'just be,' especially for those of us that live in the noise and busyness of city life.

If you haven't been to visit, it's definitely worth making the time to go and see what they are doing.
